

ROCK THE BOOKS REALLY DID ROCK





We are happy to say that this year's Summer Reading program – with the theme of Rock the Books – was a record breaker! Nearly 45,000 Jeffco residents participated in the annual reading challenge, and collectively they read more than 49 million minutes.

As part of the reading incentive, our Foundation provided a \$500 cash prize to Foothills Animal

Shelter when readers passed the initial goal of reading 40 million minutes.

The eight-week event (held from June 1 through July 31) also provided prizes and incentives to individual participants. For babies and toddlers involved in the program's extracurricular activities, JCPL offered baby toys and free admission to Lakeside Amusement Park when they registered for the program, followed by a book prize at the half-way mark (when children completed 16 literacy-related activities). At the finish line (after completing 32 activities), the young participants were entered in a prize drawing to win a portrait package (including prints and a sitting fee) which was valued at \$500.

Other prizes for children, teens and adults included: free kids meals or buy one get one free Chipotle burrito coupons, an unlimited rides pass at Lakeside Amusement Park or Elitch Gardens, book bags, free

books and entries in a prize drawing to receive a pair of movie tickets each month over a period of one year. Again this year, JCLF offered cash prizes to schools that had the highest percentage of their student body finish the Summer Reading program.

Events and activities highlighting this year's program included drone pilot camp, coding camps, face painting, performances by the Maroon Bells Morris Dancers, arts and crafts, family yoga story time, zen doodling and rock painting, building rocket planes, family nature walks, crawdad catching and much more!

More than 20 years ago, the nation was shocked by the death of JonBenét Ramsey, the tiny, six-year-old beauty pageant princess who was found murdered in the basement of her Boulder home in December 1996. It was a homicide that rocked our community, and yet the case has never been solved.

Paula Woodward, an award-winning author and former investigative journalist from Channel 9, KUSA-TV,

reported on that story from its very beginning. In 2016, Woodward wrote a book about the murder, and the title of the book began with the killer's own four ominous words scrawled in a ransom note found at the crime scene – We Have Your Daughter: The Unsolved Murder of JonBenét Ramsey, Twenty Years Later. Woodward's in-depth account of events surrounding JonBenét's death was the focal point of Murder, She Writes!, a fundraising luncheon, audience-interactive conversation and book signing that JCLF hosted at the Club at Rolling Hills on Friday, April 27. Neal Browne, Woodward's former KUSA colleague and a JCLF Board member, served as our event emcee.

Each spring, JCLF hosts this successful sale at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds, and spring 2018 was no exception. Our numbers tell the story – more than 4,500 individuals attended the event, and they browsed, collected and purchased nearly 80,000 items. The best part is that JCLF raised

more than \$75,000 at our spring sale, and those funds will help provide support for Jefferson County Public Library.

Don't forget to mark your calendars for our upcoming fall Whale of a Used Book Sale that will be held Friday through Sunday, October 19 through 21, at the Fairgrounds.

That Friday, we will open at 8 a.m. for an Early Bird admission fee of \$10 per adult. This past year, JCLF was thrilled to have received a gift of \$10,000 from the Verizon Foundation for the Golden Library's pilot project, STEMGirls. The program launched in 2016 in partnership with Bell Middle School and its girl-focused iSTEM program. Monthly program meetings were held in the Library during after-school hours throughout the school year.

For the past two years, the Golden Library has hosted a Girls in STEM competition for young women in grades 5-8. The Library has also collaborated with DECTech, Colorado School of Mines' outreach program that is carried out by female students and designed for girls. Each year, DECTech students serve as judges and mentors for the competition, in which more than 130 middle school girls have presented multiple projects to date, ranging from mechanical prosthetics and modular housing to nutrition and disease prevention. This year, more than 80 teen and tween girls participated in this program and the annual competition.

Like the monthly in-Library programs, participation in the Girls in STEM competition has exceeded all expectations, and has "closed the loop," so to speak, on encouraging girls to enter this career field. The middle school girls, who have served as monthly mentors to younger girls, were afforded the unique opportunity to work with Mines undergraduate and graduate women in STEM fields. Winners of the Girls in STEM competition have been honored each of the past two years at the Jefferson County International Women's Day Luncheon held in March.

Recently, JCLF received a second gift of \$10,000 from the Verizon Foundation to help support the STEMGirls program along with the Girls Who Code program in 2018-2019.

JCLF USED BOOK SALES ARE ALSO ONLINE!

Are you looking for some unique books, perhaps as gifts for a special person or to add to your personal collection? Did you know that you can shop for these kinds of books AND support the Jefferson County Library Foundation (JCLF) at the same time?

Our online, "virtual storefront," Jeffco Friends, has been up and running for nearly three years now, and we can tell you that business is booming! Last year, JCLF generated nearly \$18,000 through this small enterprise, which is continuing to grow year by year.

At JCLF, we use both eBay and Amazon for our online book sales, and these in-house sales are comprised mostly of vintage collectibles and rare books – typically books that you'll see without the usual bar codes.



If you click the tab on the eBay page to "see all items" or "items for sale," you can scroll through a list of books for sale. Once you've viewed those, you can go look on the left side of the page under SHOW ONLY and click on SOLD LISTINGS and see the last 80 or so books we have sold. Recently, we sold one set of dictionaries for \$600!

Most of these books come from individual donations, often from families who are downsizing or moving. As a bonus, these contributions are tax deductible! We also sell books that have been deaccessioned by Jefferson County Public Library. We do not accept donations of VHS tapes, cassettes or magazines. We do accept audio tapes, DVDs, CDs and vinyl (LP) records.

Our goal is to help find good homes for good books here in Jefferson County. If you have books to donate, you can stop by our warehouse at 10790 W. 50th Avenue, #200, in Wheat Ridge from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. If you have questions, call 303-403-5075. donors, our Foundation has been able to help JCPL provide a new and unique outdoor learning environment at the Standley Lake Library.

The groundbreaking ceremony for this new Outdoor Adventure Space took place at 11:30 a.m. on Saturday, September 22, outside the Library at 8485 Kipling St., in Arvada.

In 2016, Foundation supporter Allison Brigham contacted JCLF on behalf of her father, Arvada resident Warren Roeske, who was seeking a way to honor his deceased wife, Shirley M. Roeske, an ardent Library advocate. JCPL suggested the Outdoor Adventure Space, and over the past two years, Warren and his daughter have donated \$15,000 to seed the effort. In addition, a second

anonymous donor contributed \$35,000, giving us the funds needed to help install Phase I of this ambitious project.

The Discover Together: Outdoor Adventure Space, designed by Learning Landscapes, will provide tools and opportunities for children to engage in unstructured play in an outdoor environment. In addition, it extends the Library's commitment to help children be ready to read when they enter kindergarten and continue to support their learning as they grow.

The project, located outside the children's area on the east side of the Library, will offer two separate play areas, featuring benches and log steppers, as well as tools to spark imaginative play and learning, such as a willow house, sensory garden, fairy stumps and an insect hotel. A majority of the construction will be completed this fall, with additional elements added next spring. A formal grand opening will be held early summer 2019.

Our New Legacy Chapter

Over the years, the Jefferson County Library Foundation (JCLF) has been honored to receive many charitable estate gifts from thoughtful and generous donors who care about the future of Jefferson County Public Library.

These gifts have included deferred donations left through a variety of instruments such as wills, trusts, retirement plans and life insurance. These contributions have been used by the Library for purposes such as the construction of the new Edgewater Library.

This year the Foundation is launching a legacy giving campaign by creating our new Legacy Chapter to

recognize the generosity of those who are making charitable estate gifts or are making a current gift to the Foundation's endowment.

JCLF's Legacy Chapter represents a group of special donors who want to ensure that the Foundation provides a sustainable source of ongoing funding for Jefferson County Public Library.

Membership is available to all donors who agree to make an estate gift of any dollar amount to the Jefferson County Library Foundation. Donors who want to be recognized as part of our Legacy Chapter are asked to inform us of their plans by filling out a Donor Letter of Intent that we can send to you.

Legacy Chapter contributions will be used to grow the Foundation's endowment and may be designated by the donor for specific purposes. Our supporters can also become members of the Legacy Chapter in another way – and while they are still living – through our new Giving Circles.

A contribution of at least \$5,000 (up to \$9,999) will qualify you as a member of the Director's Circle. For gifts starting at \$10,000 and above, you qualify as a member of the President's Circle. Through either level of contribution, donors can choose to earmark their gift to help support a specific library program, or they can designate dollars to grow the general fund. Foundation helps to fund programs that the Library can't afford," she says. Jeannie also recalls the U.S. economic downfall of a decade ago, and understands that by helping to build JCLF's endowment, and when that occurs again, "we will have something to fall back on."



Her sentiments are echoed by Tom and Alice Atkins, long-time Library and Foundation supporters who have also joined the Legacy Chapter as

charter members. Tom was previously Chairman of the Jefferson County Public Library Board of Trustees, and even today, he and his wife attend nearly all the monthly Trustee meetings so they can stay active and involved in the Library.

"The Library has always meant so much to us," Alice comments, "and Tom and I feel strongly about continuing to support JCPL, both now and in the future. The Legacy Chapter offers us a way to do that, and we are pleased to be a part of this new group of supporters."

The couple recently revised their will and designated JCLF as a beneficiary in their estate plans.

"No one likes to think about passing away," Alice points out, "but it's important for us to know that what we leave behind will continue to benefit JCPL's programs, events, and activities that Tom and I are so passionate about."
