The occasion was a time to tour and celebrate Jefferson County's first Family Place Library[™] located at the Edgewater Library.

What is a Family Place Library? According to familyplacelibraries.org, "Family Place builds on the knowledge that good health, early learning, parental involvement and supportive communities play a critical role in a young child's growth and development. The overall goal of Family Place Libraries is to develop a family-friendly environment by transforming libraries into community centers for literacy, early childhood development, parent education and engagement, family support and community information."



This library model caters to babies and small children and their families. Family Place Libraries are designed to create fun and welcoming environments where children and their caregivers can play, learn and grow together. In these specially designed areas, parents and children will find hands-on, interactive materials such as board and picture books, age-appropriate toys, puzzles, dramatic play items, blocks and drawing stations. This is the kind of library setting that invites little ones to explore, enjoy and learn!

EXPLORE JCPL'S NEW OUTDOOR ADVENTURE SPACE

The ribbon-cutting ceremony and celebration of the new **Discover Together: Outdoor** Adventure Space took place Saturday, July 20.



Professionally designed by Learning Landscapes, this unique space provides an outdoor, exploratory environment where children can engage in unstructured play.



Located outside the children's area on the east side of the Standley Lake Library building, the space features two separate play areas

that include sensory and habitat gardens, benches and fairy stumps, as well as tools to spark children's imaginative play and learning, such as a willow dome and child-sized wheelbarrows, trowels and watering cans. The new area even boasts an "insect hotel" that gives bugs a place to live and allows our Library

Offering these activities outside also encourages exercise and contributes to emotional and physical health.
"This new Outdoor Adventure Space extends the Library's commitment to help children be ready to read when they enter kindergarten and continue to support their learning as they grow," remarks Donna Walker, executive director of Jefferson County Public Library.
As an added bonus, youngsters can earn a special library explorer badge after completing outdoor activities and by taking a pledge to always be curious and exploring. This idea was inspired by the National Park's Junior Ranger Program.

SUMMER READING WAS SUPER FUN!

How did you spend your summer? We know that more than 44,000 Jeffco residents spent the season reading as they participated in JCPL's annual Summer Reading challenge!

Local book lovers logged 42,398,725 minutes enjoying good reads throughout the eight-week program from June 1 through July 31.

And not only did the event include reading great books, JCPL staff also created a whole line-up of events and activities to keep readers engaged in the program. Here are some examples:

This year's reading challenge was promoted in many ways – online, on air (thanks to a marketing partnership with Comcast), through the Library's new Connect magazine and through sign-up opportunities that were available at all Library locations and staffed by teen volunteers. Plus, we have to thank all the promotional efforts of JCPL employees

who encouraged patrons to join in the challenge.

"There isn't one employee (of the Library) who didn't contribute to Summer Reading in one way or another, and for that, I am thankful," says Cindy Jaye, JCPL's program manager.

1000 BOOKS BEFORE KINDERGARTEN

Each year, JCLF is happy to support specialized Library programs under the umbrella of Early Childhood Literacy, and one of those programs is known as 1000 Books Before Kindergarten.

This popular, nationwide literacy program encourages parents, caregivers and guardians to introduce babies, toddlers and small children to the world of reading.

The program is simple. Parents or guardians choose a book or story to read to their child (they can read the same story multiple times – that counts, too!), they keep an account of the readings (by logging in the books or stories read on a hard copy sheet given to participants via the Library, or through an online portal), and soon each participating child is on his/ her way to the 1,000 mark! The goal is to ensure that every child in Jefferson County – no matter their socio-economic status – is ready to read by the time they begin kindergarten.

JCPL began the 1000 Books Before Kindergarten model program in 2016 in three Jefferson County cities – Edgewater, Wheat Ridge and Lakewood. The Library targeted areas with predominantly lowincome families, and where students were identified as falling short for overall literacy and schoolreadiness. Today, JCPL has expanded the program to all 10 branch libraries and the bookmobile.

At its beginning, 286 children (plus their parents or guardians) signed up for this initial project in the three start-up locations. As of July of this year, 5,788 young children and families have signed up for this program – more than 20 times the number of participants in 2016. Added to that number, 297 children have completed the program to date, and 512 youngsters are at the halfway (500 books) mark!

The program is also helping to encourage prereading skills at Head Start centers, where JCPL brings the program to disadvantaged children in day care.

"Our role is to get families excited about reading," remarks Head Start's Lead Family Support Specialist
