### **UPDATE ON OUR BOOK AND MEDIA DONATIONS PROCESS**

uring the COVID-19 pandemic, JCLF used many precautions to prevent the spread of the disease. One way was to quarantine books donated by the public in a POD placed in our parking lot.

For several months, we continued holding the books in this receptacle as a means of streamlining our book donation process. This helped us maintain a steady flow of books and media into our warehouse and enabled our volunteers to more easily process the items by scanning, sorting and boxing them.

Today, as the donations are sorted, we distribute them in several ways. Some are boxed up and readied for our semi-annual Whale of a Used Book Sales, and some are delivered to our Whale's Tale Books & Gifts shop. We also help stock book sales shelves at various JCPL branch locations, we set some books aside as donations to other nonprofits as well as for jails and prisons, and we supply two of our outside vendors with books either for a monthly per-pallet rate of pay or as consignment sales.

Currently, we are continuing to accept book and media donations on two weekdays only - Mondays and Tuesdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. We accept a maximum of six boxes of books per donation. Please check our website for updates on our book donation days and hours: www. jeffclf.org. \*

# **Director's Notes**



This year has brought about many changes and exciting events, even since our last newsletter was printed this past spring. Despite COVID-19 and the looming Delta variant, we have been able to accomplish quite a lot this year.

In late June, JCLF hosted its first Whale

of a Used Book Sale for the year, and we did this at a new location – the gymnasium and classrooms at the Lakewood Church of the Nazarene. In July, we presented two key events, our Friends Annual Meeting followed by our Volunteer Appreciation awards celebration and picnic. August brought about two more events, including a tent sale at the Brass Armadillo Antique Mall in Wheat Ridge and later on, we launched our new fundraising series called "Authors in the Afternoon," featuring awardwinning novelists W. Michael Gear and Kathleen O'Neal Gear.

I'm also very happy to tell you that our new bookstore - Whale's Tale Books & Gifts - is continuing to be a successful sales venture for JCLF, in that we have typically been raising between \$11,000 and \$13,000 in gross sales each month.

If you visit our office/warehouse complex, you'll also see that our Foundation has recently expanded! Starting September 1, JCLF leased an adjacent unit at our current location, and that has enabled us to physically grow. This expansion has doubled our warehouse space and has provided us with a whole new office area.

We are looking forward to more excitement in the days to come. As you read through the articles in this issue of JCLF's *Footnotes* newsletter, you'll see that we will be hosting our second Whale of a Used Book Sale this fall. I'm delighted to say that we will be back at the Jeffco Fairgrounds for this event, which will take place October 28-31.

We couldn't do all these events and activities without the support of our fantastic volunteers, donors, sponsors and Friends of the Library. Thank you for your continued support during the pandemic, and for assisting us in our mission to provide fundraising support and advocacy for Jefferson County Public Library.

### JCLF STRETCHES INTO A NEW OFFICE/ WAREHOUSE SPACE

arlier this year, the JCLF Board of Directors approved a new lease that has helped our Foundation physically expand from its current location into an adjacent unit at the L&K Business Center in Wheat Ridge. The new lease, which began on September 1, has doubled our warehouse and office space, and has helped make our facility safer for our staff and volunteers.

"This expansion has been long awaited and much needed," says JCLF Board President Ana Rojas-Artica. "With the recent addition of new staff members, and with the amazing flood of book donations that keep rolling in, our Board decided that now is the time to increase our office and warehouse space."

The move will offer more elbow room and storage space for our administrative personnel in the office area. Plus, with more warehouse square footage, our staff and volunteers will have ample room to accept, sort, box and stack book and media donations safely. We will also have added space to store pallets of books, equipment and supplies for our events and off-site book sales. In addition, the expansion gives us another access to our warehouse, providing us with an additional overhead door on the south side of the building. This means that we can more efficiently and easily accept donations from the public on the north side of the building while also accommodating our two used book sales vendors with pick-up access on the south side.

We're also making a space where our talented volunteers can create and store multiple holiday-themed gift baskets. These items are top money-makers at our Whale's Tale Books & Gifts shop in Colorado Mills Mall, and they are also popular at our semi-annual Whale of a Used Book Sales.

### FALL WHALE OF A USED BOOK SALE – BACK TO THE FAIRGROUNDS!

ach year, we are proud to produce our semiannual Whale of a Used Book Sales, one of the many ways in which we raise funds to support our public library. Even though COVID-19 prevented us from producing our spring 2020 sale, we were successful in hosting a fall 2020 sale, as well as a summer 2021 sale, where we followed timely health protocols as far as wearing facial coverings, social distancing and frequent hand sanitizing.

We are happy to announce that our fall 2021 Whale of a Used Book Sale is scheduled to take place Oct. 28-31 at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds. The big sale, featuring thousands of gently used books, CDs, DVDs, vinyl records and rare books, will begin Thursday evening, Oct. 28, with the Friends-Only Preview Night occurring from 6 to 8 p.m. The sale will open to the public Friday through Sunday, Oct. 29-31. Open hours for Friday and Saturday will be 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and on Sunday, the 31st, our hours will be 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Admission to the fall 2021 Whale of a Used Book Sale is \$5 per person daily, with children (up to age 18) free.

At this time, and with the continuing rise in the pandemic's Delta variant, we are unsure if we will need to limit admission to the event as we did in fall 2020 and in summer 2021. If the Jefferson County Health Department reinstates previous health mandates, we will be forced to decrease exhibit hall capacity at any one time, meaning that – as we did last year – we will require online reservations with a \$5 fee per 50 minutes of shopping, and 10 minutes allowed for check-out.

### **OUR SUMMERTIME WHALE SALE!**

staff and volunteers took on some interesting new challenges as our Foundation prepared to host a summertime Whale of a Used Book Sale at the end of June. And those challenges came from many directions.

First, we changed the date of our traditional spring sale, and pushed the event back by three weeks to the last full week in June. Then we added an extra day of sales by offering Friends Preview Night on Wednesday, June 23, and opened the sale to the public for four days, Thursday through Sunday, June 24-27. We also capped attendance at 80 shoppers per hour and implemented a pre-paid, hourly reservation system, similar to our fall 2020 sale. These decisions were made in order to accommodate more shoppers, provide more space for social distancing and in the hope that most individuals would have received COVID-19 vaccinations by the time the sale began.

We faced another new challenge due to a change in venue. Instead of holding the event at our traditional site – the Jefferson County Fairgrounds - we moved to the Lakewood Church of the Nazarene's gymnasium and Life Center classrooms at 13th and Dover in Lakewood.

### AWARD-WINNING NOVELISTS LAUNCH "AUTHORS IN THE AFTERNOON"

he date was Friday, August 27, the time was 4 p.m. and the setting was the Monarch Room at the Denver Marriott West in Golden. That was when JCLF kicked off the first in a new fundraising series called "Authors in the Afternoon," featuring New York Times bestselling authors W. Michael Gear and Kathleen O'Neal Gear.

The prolific Wyoming-based writers gave our audience (both in person and via livestream) a chance to hear more about their literary backgrounds and the many genres and themes their works encompass – everything from prehistoric fiction and sci-fi to modern-day thrillers and cli-fi. The Gears' books have been translated into 29 languages, and they have more than 17 million copies in print worldwide.

Both of the Gears recently received the Owen Wister Award for lifetime contributions to western literature, and they were inducted into the Western Writers Hall of Fame. The husband-and-wife team was also honored with two 2021 International Book Awards. Michael's book, Unreconciled, won for best science fiction novel, and Kathleen's book, Cries from the Lost Island, won for best Young Adult novel.

More than 40 in-person guests enjoyed coffee, tea and an array of delightful desserts during the afternoon event, and

### WHALE'S TALE KEEPS KEEPS SWIMMING **ALONG**

early one year ago - on Black Friday, November 27 our Foundation took a leap of faith and opened up a used bookstore in Colorado Mills Mall. It was near the height of the COVID-19 pandemic when Whale's Tale Books & Gifts opened. This started as an experiment because we needed a location to host our annual winter holiday book sales, and the Library's meeting rooms were not available to us in 2020 (these rooms were needed guarantine returned books at all branch JCPL locations).

We first signed a six-week lease, and what started as a test proved to be a tremendous success! Despite the global pandemic, JCLF raised more than \$28,000 from November 27, 2020, through January 17, 2021. Since that time, our organization has extended the lease at Colorado Mills Mall, and we are continuing to reap a huge bounty, typically averaging between \$11,000 and \$13,000 in gross monthly sales. Beyond selling gently used books, CDs, DVDs, audiobooks and vinyl records, Whale's Tale also sells new items such as jewelry, handbags, scarves, jigsaw puzzles, greeting cards, journals, reading glasses and more.

Some of the most popular items sold at the shop include themed gift baskets designed by two of our very talented JCLF volunteers, Mickey Lytle and Sandy Kramer. In November and December of last year, this creative duo supplied us with 99 holiday baskets, and 95% of them sold! We have also had an enormous response to our vinyl record sales. Recently, we sold one record (by the group Velvet

Underground) for \$250, followed by a one-time sale of 25+ records for more than \$1,500.

To help keep our operations costs low, JCLF relies on dedicated volunteers to staff the shop seven days a week, from noon to 6 p.m. Sunday through Friday, and from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturdays. We have two paid Foundation staff members who oversee the storefront operation -Kirstin Kraig, our volunteer and Friends coordinator, and our weekend Bookstore Assistant Janet Spaeth.

"The success of our Whale's Tale Books & Gift shop has been truly amazing," comments Linda Fleming, JCLF Board Secretary. "We've also heard many of our shoppers say 'This is my new favorite store!'" Whale's Tale has even gained popularity with the Mall management team, who have become frequent visitors to the busy shop.

### **COLORADO WOMEN'S DAY BRINGS IN A BIG DONATION – \$2,000 TO JCLF!**

ue to the COVID-19 pandemic, this year's Colorado Women's Day celebration was delayed by a couple of months, but that didn't stop the fun, informationsharing and entertainment that this annual event always provides. The 2021 event took place Friday, May 7, at Baldoria on the Water in Lakewood, and JCLF was once again a recipient of event proceeds. That meant JCLF received a check for \$2,000!

The day-long event offered morning workshops, a luncheon, a keynote address, an awards presentation and a creative post-luncheon workshop. More than 150 women (and several men!) attended this year's celebration of women.



Jo Packham was the luncheon's keynote speaker. She is the creator and Editor-in-Chief of a line of popular crafts, work-related and cooking magazines. During her presentation, Jo drew on her 35 years of experience as a leading innovator in the handmade publishing market. Her remarks were followed by an afternoon workshop led by Betsy Wiersma, founder of the CampExperience™ Network. This woman-owned business is described as "a one-of-a-kind women's group" providing monthly networking, sponsored social events and an annual Fall Retreat.

The original Jeffco International Women's Day was launched five years ago by Deborah Deal, CEO of IX Power Foundation and JCLF's Board vice president. This year, the event name was changed to Colorado Women's Day in order to include more women statewide. The 2021 sponsors included: City of Golden, Bank of Colorado, City of Westminster, Colorado Women's Alliance and the Jefferson County Library Foundation.

ur Foundation is thrilled to announce that we recently received a \$100,000 contribution that is designated for the Belmar Library's Discover Together: Outdoor Adventure Space. This gift came from donor Allison Brigham and the estate of her late father, Warren Roeske. or many years, JCLF has helped to fund Jefferson County Public Library's (JCPL) annual summer reading program, and this year was no exception! This year, the program was called *Library Summer Challenge*. While the name may have changed, the end goal remained the same – to help students and young children maintain or increase their reading skills by reading all summer long.

The program was "wildly" successful! More than 28,000 Jeffco residents (children, teens and adults) participated in the eight-week program from June 1 through July 31.

JCPL planned many outdoorsy activities to reinforce the "Wild Ideas" theme. Keeping in mind that COVID-19 remained a concern, most activities were ones that children, families, teens, and adults could do on their own, and outside of group or library settings. Sample activities included: visiting a park and making

a list of wildlife; writing a review of a favorite book or movie; reading to a pet or stuffed animal; creating a wild creature out of play dough or clay and researching your family tree using Library resources.

Participating readers earned prizes when they reached the half-way mark and the program's finish line. Prizes included free stickers, new books, sun hats (for babies and toddlers), book bags for adults and free passes to Elitch Gardens amusement park for teens.

The Library also hosted its annual Summer Challenge School Contest, where Jeffco schools competed for prizes based on the number of hours their students read and the number of participants in the program. Here are this year's school winners, each of which received an \$800 prize contributed by our Foundation:

In addition, and because participants reached this year's collective reading goal, JCLF provided a \$500 prize to the 2021 Community Challenge Beneficiary, Jeffco Eats. Jeffco Eats is a local nonprofit that provides weekend meals and snacks for children and families, ensuring that no child goes hungry in Jeffco Title I Schools, GAP schools, Section 8 apartments, rec centers, parks, and Head Start programs.

### **NEWS FROM OUR 2020 FINANCIAL AUD**

ach year, our nonprofit Foundation undergoes an independent audit- a review of our organization's finances from the previous fiscal year. Our 2020 auc was conducted by JDS Professional Group.

Highlighting the report were details on the ways we are providing support for Jefferson County Public Library (JCPL). On pages 19 and 20 of the document, the audito point out that last year JCLF provided \$179,635 in cash assistance to JCPL while the Library supplied \$75,943 in in-kind goods and services to the Foundation. This is a 2.4-to-1 cash return on the Library's (and the taxpayers') investment.

The amount of in-kind that JCLF returned to the Library was the balance of our operations budget at \$515,450,
